Although investment in education for the development of human resources is essential for the intellectual and economic development of the country, the allocation for education was always ridiculously meagre.

It is also curious to know how this inadequate. fund, as was available for education, has so long been utilised for purposes other than furthering the cause of education. The many changes brought in the administrative hierarchy. eand the various reorganisate. ions made in the departmental set-up of education so long were not really aimed at improving the lot of education system itself.

The larger portion of the budget allocation of the

Surprisingly, no improvement at the field level was felt necessary.

The educational institutions at the ground level on the other hand had to depend on doles. There still, exist thousands of primary schools in the remote villages where pupils sit on the ground and take shelter under the trees and also hundreds of secondary schools, both in urban and rural areas, with students jampacked in pigeon-holes.

The half-fed and halfclad teachers of both. primary and secondary schools as well as the field

they are denied of adequate facilities necessary for keeping the institutions functioning.

It is heartening to learn that the government is thinking for an overhauling of the education sector in the near future. We would hope that attempts would be made to go deep into the root of all and the combination of the malaise and measures by taken so that the children of and foreign aids has thus, the common people, spread been exhausted in over sixty five thousand villages of Bangladesh, can get a proper return, of the money invested in educating. them.

We want that the education system of the country is changed and the term development, in education should mean development of the children we teach. We want no more buildings and offices. No more committees and commissions do we need. We meed more children to be j educated and wish to see! them educated properly.
