The National Education Ad. visory Council (UIEAC) recommended making present this circumstance free primary education compul-SOLA phases reports ENA.

This was contained in the final report of the NEAC - on interim education policy adopted on February 8.

According to the recommendation primary education should be made compulsory up to class I during the current year while up to class II, III IV and V respectively by 1980 1981, 1982 and 1983.

It said 'primary education will be universal, compulsory and free for a perod of five vears.

The NEAC further recom. mended that about 30,000 new primaru schoo's having single class room should be set up. in the vi lage to make the programme a success. New classes will be added levery year in such schools

These schools will be run side by eide with the existing full-fledged primary schools.

The NEAC suggested that a mee the requirement. of the new one clase of many schoole be financed by both the national and local government for an interim period dun to

It said that full-time trained reachers should be appointed in these scools with the of this interim system in 1983. For this, 150,060 teachers more should be appointed in addition to the present 1.75,000. The process of appointing new teachere should gradually be i completed by 1983 with the appointment of 30,000 teachers every year.

The NEAC noted that the existing facilities for primary education ar, not full, Jutilised because a large number of students leave schools due to existing 37,000 primary schools

have not 250 students each that it can accommodate. suggested that sus well as basic social economic reforms should be initiated to implement the programme of making primary education compulsory.

According to the recommendation there will be a uniform syl'abue for the primar, education. It suggested that kindergartens and other special schools should be closed and thereby merged into general primary schools. It called for supplying books and other educational materials free of cost to the children of marginal and landless peasants. The NEAC recommended to formulate a uniform service rule for the primary school teacher keeping their service status intact.

It said that female teachers shouldebe appointed in primary schools on priority basis.
