This Committee recommended a structure of syllabi for Classes IX and X which called for introduction of uni-track system with science as a compulsory subject In that | perspective the then Government decided in 1981 to introduct uni-track syllabi with science as a compulsory sub.

To introduce a curriculam with science as a compulsory subject the Committee in 1978 recommended for creating necessary facilities for imparting science education and training the science teachers. Accord. ingly two projects were taken up to supply equipment for science teaching and for the training of teachers. As there
