Withdrawal of ban on publication of note books urged

Bangladesh Book Publishers and Sellers Association has urged the government to allow the publication of 'Guide Books' and withdrawal of the ban on the publication o? 'note books'.

The association has also demanded that its allottee member publishers under the control of National Educational Curriculum and Text Book Board should continue to enjoy the facilities for printing and mar-- keting of books. The recent government decision to acord approvals to three books on each subject at the secondary levels and marketing of the same through publishers in the private sector should be withdrawn and the 'submit' system should not be re-intro-Contd on page 8 col 5
