

394 SSC examinees expelled

RAJSHAHI, Mar. 17.—At least 394 SSC examinees were expelled for adopting unfair means from different centres of Rajshahi, Natore, Naogaon, Sirajgonj, Pabna and Thakurgaon, according to the Education Board control room here, reports BSS.

The sources said that SSC examinations in all the centres of Rajshahi Board were held peacefully and no untoward incident was reported.

Chittagong

SSC examinations in all centres and sub-centres of Chittagong city and the Chittagong district began today peacefully, official sources said.

In the city a total of 6,546 students are appearing in the examinations including 3,800 boys and 2,746 girls.

In the metropolitan area the Board has set up three examination centres and 14 sub-centres.

A total of 21,932 examinees are appearing in the examinations from 15 centres of 14 Upazilas in the

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district. Of them 14,551 are boys and 7,381 are girls, district administration officials said.

The SSC examinations of 1988 under four Education Boards (Dhaka Comilla, Jessore and Rajshahi began today peacefully.

A total of 4,16,061 candidates are taking part in the examinations where 2,86,462 are male and 1,29,599 are female candidates. There will be 475 examination centres all over the country. Dhaka Board authority has set up 130 centres including seven abroad.

In Dhaka Board the number of candidates is 1,26,161 including 83,964 male and 42,197 female. In Comilla Board there are 1,01,397 candidates including 69,847 male and 31,550 female. In Jessore Board 89,547 candidates will appear at the examinations where 61,251 are male and 28,296 are female. In Rajshahi Board among the total 98,956 candidates there are 71,400 male and 27,556 are female.

The Dhaka Board authority in a Press release on Wednesday said that all necessary steps to hold the examinations peacefully have been taken. It called upon all concerned to help the authority to conduct the examinations peacefully.
