Some meritorious students of Comilla Board

The female candidate did better than their male counterparts in the Higher Secondary Certificate (HSC) Examination this year held under the Board of Intermediate and Secondary Education (BISE), Comilla.

So far as the percentage of pass is concerned female examinees had better results securing 52.47% over 51.46% of the males. But the female examinees could not score comparatively better results than the male examinees in the combined merit list.

Out of 20 positions secured by 26 meritorious students, only one position has been secured by a female student in the combined merit list. That is too 20th position. Total of 66,753 examinees appeared in the HSC exam, of which 51,345 are male and 15,408 are female examinee.

However in the group-wise merit list published by the board, female students maintained lead position. In the Humanities and Agricultural Science groups 6 top positions were secured by female examinees. 10. But in the merit list of Commerce group, only 2 female examinees got positions out of first 10 positions.

On the other hand, the overall results of Comilla Board was bad. Comilla Board topped the pass percentage list among four education boards in the country last year with 54.35%, which declined to 51.70% this year. Dhaka Board with 57.75% pass secured the top position by battering 52.33% registered last year by Comilla Board.

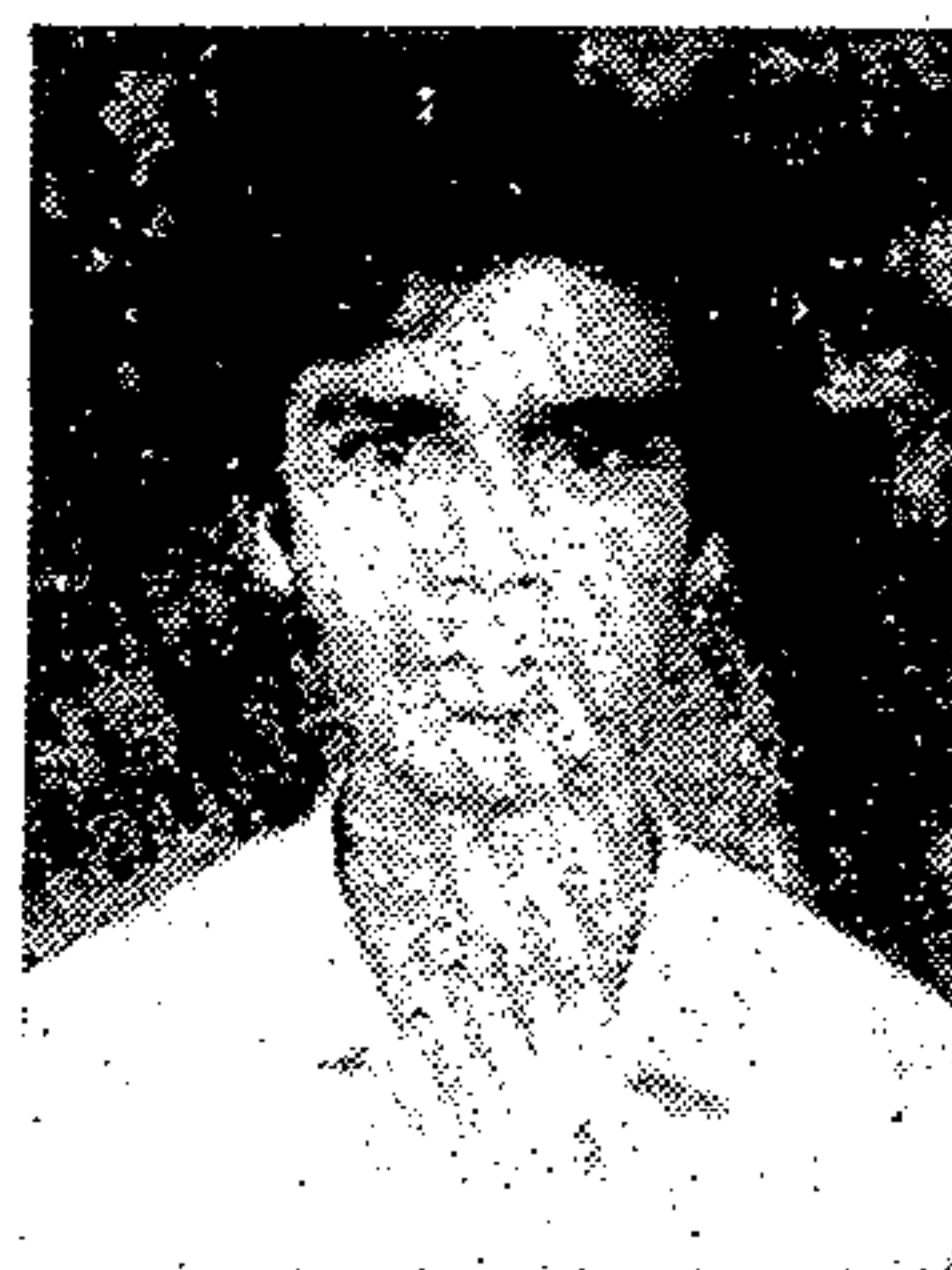
He wants to become a computer engineer. Reading books, listening to Rabindra Sangeet and heaving cricket relays are his favourite past time.
