Among the significant works of Mr. Akbaruddin are, "Sindhu Bijay", "Nadir "Mujahid" -plays: Manush", "Berajal" and "Abhineta" --novels: "Galpo" "Asamapto Kahini" and "Annyan-Galpo" —short stories; "Pather Dishari" -biography.
