The preliminary Masters degree candidates have been waiting for starting their second part classes as

they completed first part about a

year ago.

Series of armed clashes and violences on the campus affect the genuine students. It is observed that most of the armed vandals and political hoodlums are outsiders. But the authority could not take any measure against them.

Investigation shows that majority of the teachers do not take classes regularly. They cannot fin-* ish the courses. Most of them are busy with other activities than the academic functions. Allegations have been made that the scripts are not examined by many of the teachers within stipulated time and results could not be published as usual.

Dhaka University had been closed sine die on July 15 following an armed clash between the members of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal and pro-JSD (Inu) Chhatra

League.

It is an irony of fate that a student of Dhaka University loses several years to get a degree for which he or she has no hand.
