Classes to resume today

JCD calls off nonstop strike in DU

In a dramatic development, Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) on Friday unconditionally called off their nonstop student strike at Dhaka University, paving the way for immediate resumption of academic activities in the country's

premier university.

The BNP-backed student organisation withdrew the threemonth nonstop strike after getting stern directive from the high-ups of BNP on the previous day, in-siders said. "We're not in a posi-tion to call off the strike but the BNP high command asked us to withdraw it, said a Vice-President of JCD seeking anonymity.

With the crisis on the campus now over, classes will resume today (Saturday). Examinations of different departments and insti-tutes will be rescheduled soon, university authorities said.

To recover the losses already incurred by the strike, the university authorities would hold examinations on the weekly holidays (Fridays) in three shifts, a senior official of the examination controller's office said.

Examinations of more than 500 papers were postponed due to strike enforced since July 29. The university would suffer at least one-year session jam due to the

strike, the authorities said.
"We call off the strike considering the sufferings and sentiment of the students." JCD DU Unit President Monir Hossain said at an impromptu Press conference at Madhu's Canteen. movement against the partisan Vice- Chancellor will continue until his resignation," he added.

The JCD leader said that they

would provide security for those would provide security for those who left the university dorms after October 1 polls. "We believe in democracy and every student who supports any ideology has the right to live in the dorms," he said.

Talking on the incident of at-tacking the residences of some hall provosts, he said, "Those weren't done by Chhatra Dal supporters.'

Vice-Chancellor Prof AK Azad Chowdhury said "I'm happy, but not so happy because at least one year has elapsed from the life of my students," he said adding that "none won, none lost with the strike but the university suffered a

Meanwhile, students at many dormitories alleged that outsiders including some known terrorists of the city got into the dormitories under some JCD stalwarts' shelter.

"A known terror of Hajaribagh is moving through Muhsin Hall and at least 20 terrorists are staying in the hall," alleged a resident of Muhsin Hall.
