The leaders of GCO from the rallies warned that they would announce tougher action programmes on July 29, if their demands are not met by the time.

JCD also brought out a procession and held a rally on the campus supporting the strike. JCD leaders from the rally also demanded of the authorities to meet their demands within the ultimatheir demands within the ultimatum.

Criticising the ban on holding rallies in and around the Administrative Building of the university, the JCD leaders said that the ban had been imposed in fear of students' wrath against the DU authorities authorities.

Protesting the strike and rampage on VC's official car, BCL brought out a procession and held a rally on the campus. The BCL leaders demanded of the authorities to take stern action against the persons responsible for the incident as per the university's Proceedings Pulse torial Rules.

The leaders also condemned the ransacking of the portraits of Ban-gabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman at different offices and institutions across the country.
