

Bangladeshi students can imnensely benefit from the excellent iducational facilities as well as acquire additional points for migration to Australia if they come to itudy and stay in South Australia, eports BSS.

This was stated by Ms. Paula Nagel, chairperson of Education Adelaide when the Bangladesh nigh commissioner to Australia M. Humayun Kabir met her in Adelaide on Thursday, according to a message received in Dhaka on Friday.

As a part of his continuing efforts to 'explore new academic opportunities for Bangladeshi students, earlier Bangladesh High Commissioner met Professor John Taplin, Pro-vice Chancellor of the University of Adelaide, Ms. Brenda Peyser, Executive Director, Heinz School, Carnegic Mellon University in Adelaide, Mr. Anna Ciccarelli, Executive Director International and Development, University of South Australia, Professor Roger Leigh, Head of School, School of Agriculture, University

of Adelaide and Professor Dean Forbes, Vice President of Flinders, University to explore opportunities in those Universities.

'The high commissioner proved possibilities of cooperation in academic field between Bangladesh and South Australia in three areas, increase of scope for admission of more Bangladeshi students with financial support in those universities, exchange of faculty members with a view to improving their skill and undertaking research on issues of common interest between Bangladesh and Australia.

All of them expressed their interest to work on those areas with Bangladeshi University having matching interest and level of quality and standard in education and research.

The governor of South Australia, Marjorie Jackson- Nelson, AC, CVO, MBE, hosted a luncheon at the government House in honour of the High Commissioner and Mrs. Kabir yesterday.

During the discussion over luncheon, the high commissioner briefed the governor about the consolidation of democracy, empowerment of women, progress in education, particularly that of girls; disaster management and improvement in health care in Bangladesh.

She deeply appreciated those impressive advances and expressed interest to study the disaster management strategy in Bangladesh given the susceptibility of various nations to natural disaster, including in Australia, which is facing the bush fire challenges during the current summer season.
