exhausted Muhith, midway of his speech, took off his coat. Elderly President * Zillur Rahman, members of the diplomatic corps, business community leaders, three services chiefs and senior officials were present in the House during the Finance Minister's budget speech.

This is the first budget of the Awami League-led alli-

ance government that came to power in December last with overwhelming majority pledging to curb corruption. ensuring good governance and improving the lot of cómmon man.

"We are, firmly committed to use the opportunity, expectation of the people from the democratic government is sky high," he admitted and pleaded that a reasonable time should be allowed to the government to fulfill its commitment.
