

Protest at DU questions leak on

Pro-BNP teachers want investigation

PROGRESSIVE Students' Alliance, a platform of leftwing students, on Tuesday staged demonstration against alleged leak of Dhaka University's 'D unit' question paper demanding investigation into the allegation and postponement of the admission process until the probe was completed.

Meanwhile, Bangladesh Nationalist Party-Jamaat backed white panel's teachers of Dhaka University also demanded postponement of the admission process until the probe was completed.

In a statement signed by,

white panel's convener professor Akhter Hossain Khan, they said that such kind of allegation was a big blow towards the university's reputation and countrymen would lose their faith to the university.

The university should clear its stance into the allegation and the admission process should be postponed until the allegation was cleared

by the probe body.

Leaders and activists of the alliance brought out a procession from Madhur Canteen of the university which paraded different streets on the campus and ended at the arts faculty.

addressing the gathering, alliance leaders demanded postponement of the admission process under 'D unit' until the investigation was completed.

They also said that the alleged question leak was a blue scheme of the vested quarters to completely destroy the country's higher education system.

They also threatened to wage tougher movement if their demands were ignored by the authority.

Alliance leaders Bangladesh Chhatra Union central general secretary Liton Nandi, Bangladesh Chhatra Federation's central president

Golam Mostofa, Samajtantrik Chhatra Front's central president Naima Khaled Monika and Biplabi Chhatra Maitree's joint convener Iqbal Kabir addressed the rally.

Dhaka University Sunday published the re-sults of the entrance examination for bachelor's degree courses under 'D unit' amid allegations of question paper leak followed by widespread criticism and protests.

Dismissing the allegation, vice-chancellor Professor Professor Akhtaruzzaman claimed on Sunday that there was no possibility of question paper being leaked as the monitoring system was very strict.
